*** WINDOWS 7 VULNERABLE TO EXPLOIT IN ZOOM ***

Earlier this week a security researcher shared a remote code execution "0 day" vulnerability in Zoom Client for Windows 7 with our team. The vulnerability allows a remote attacker to execute arbitrary code on victim's computer where Zoom Client for Windows (any currently supported version) is installed by getting the user to perform some typical action such as opening a document file. No security warning is shown to the user in the course of attack. We analyzed the issue and determined it to be only exploitable on Windows 7 and older Windows systems. While Microsoft's official support for Windows 7 has ended this January,

The researcher (who wants to keep their identity private) stated that they did not report the vulnerability to Zoom either directly or through a broker, but would not object to us reporting it to Zoom.

[Update 7/13/2020: Zoom only took one (!) day to issue a new version of Client for Windows that fixes this vulnerability, which is remarkable. We have reviewed their fix and can confirm that it efficiently resolves the vulnerability.]

Editor: Many of you are using ZOOM now and Windows 7. Please ensure your ZOOM is Version 5.1.3 dated July 10th or newer.

*** TECH CLASSES MOVE ONLINE***

I've been teaching ham classes for more than a dozen years now. My specialty has been the one-day Tech class. In this type of class, you review all of the questions in the question pool with the students over the course of six to eight hours, and then immediately give them the test before they can forget anything.

I would hold these classes three or four times a year and regularly have 20 – 30 students in each class. The pandemic, of course, has put the kibosh on these classes. The last one I taught was in January.

Frankly, I was wondering if I'd ever teach one again. A little over a month ago, however, I was approached by a fellow in Portland, Oregon about teaching an online class for some folks that he'd corralled there. After giving it some thought, I said yes.

So, now, in place of face-to-face classes, I'm teaching online Tech classes. There are plusses and minuses to this approach. One negative is that I miss the face-to-face interaction with the students. On the plus side, teaching online allows me to offer classes more frequently. My first was in June. Last week, I completed the second class, and in August, I will teach a third class.

I have had to make some changes to the format. Making people sit in front of a computer for six hours or more seemed like cruel and unusual punishment. So, instead of a one-day class, the online class consists of four, two-hour sessions, spanning two weeks:

- Session 1
 - Electrical Principles
 - Electronic Components and Circuit Diagrams
- Session 2
 - Radio Wave Characteristics
 - Antennas and Feed Lines
- Session 3
 - Amateur Radio Signals
 - Electrical Safety
 - Amateur Radio Practices and Station Setup
- Sessions 4
 - Station Equipment

- Operating Procedures
- Rules and Regulations

This seems to be working out pretty well. I'm using Zoom, and most people have been able to attend without too much hassle. To simulate the whiteboard that I use extensively in the face-to-face class, I'm using the Autodesk Sketchbook program (<https://www.sketchbook.com/>) and sharing my screen with the Zoom meeting attendees. To write on the "whiteboard," I'm using a Gaomon M10K2018 drawing tablet.

Sketchbook allows me to build up a document in layers, and the result is kind of a hybrid PowerPoint presentation and whiteboard. I can make layers appear when I start discussing a particular topic and then write over them. For example, when I go over the questions that use Ohm's Law to calculate current in a circuit, I display the later with " $E = I \times R$ " and on a second layer, show how to calculate the answers to the questions

To take the test, students have to sign up for an online test session. Fortunately, several VE groups are offering online, remote testing. To sign up for one of these sessions, all students have to do is go to <https://hamstudy.org/sessions>. For the first two classes, the W5YI VEC scheduled a special test session.

I foresee teaching these classes monthly until the demand wanes. The next class will start on Monday, August 3. * MOUNTING AN HF ANTENNA *

We have verticals, dipoles, yagis, loops and, good heavens even Isotrons. What is the best support to mount your antenna on?

If you look closely at the advertising for many of the antennas, they are mounted on a metal mast. There is good reason for this.

Metal is strong. A light metal mast will hold up when properly supported. Metal masts can be acquired at a local hardware in many sizes.

However you say my plastic mast will do that too (not PVC).

There is one thing the plastic masts cannot do, conduct electricity. You can electrically ground a metal pole. Having the end of a metal mast in the air is better than having only the antenna up there to take a static hit.

You say you can run a ground wire up the plastic pole. This is true, but if your coax is going up next to it, it could get interesting. What will the ground wire attach to? The antenna, or a conductive rod? A metal mast takes care of all this.

Metal masts, being of ground potential, can be used to tweak the impedance of the antenna, but that is for another time.

If you are going to put up a dipole, yagi, elevated vertical or an Isotron, a metal mast or structure can serve you better. Even the loops can be supported with metal masts, but that is not always practical. Whatever mast you use, most antennas will work. The support mast will cause some variations with the antenna values.

25 MORE ANDROID APPS TO REMOVE

Google has removed 25 malicious apps from the Google Play Store after the French cybersecurity firm [Evina](#) discovered they contained Facebook-hacking malware. That means it's time once again to check your Android device to make sure you didn't foolishly (or accidentally) install a crappy app.

The list of apps includes flashlight tools, pedometers, image editors and more, but they're all basically the same app. Sure, they all perform their different features as advertised, and they look different on the surface, but they all contain the same malicious code built to steal your Facebook login information.

The bad-news apps would check if the Facebook app was open in the background, then sneak a browser tab with a fake Facebook login page into the open background app's window, enticing you to fill in your info. The fake page would copy your login and password and send them to a remote server that has since been shut down.

Apps removed from Google Play should [automatically be removed](#) from any devices they were installed on, but it's worth double-checking—especially if you have side-loaded anything on your device. If affected, you should reset your Facebook password and update your security settings—[enabling two-factor authentication](#) is always a good bet—right away.

Normally I'd make sure to remind folks to check those app permissions to make sure there's nothing sketchy happening under the hood, but these apps were suckering users with fake Facebook login pages rather than doing anything untoward behind the scenes. That said, [checking app permissions before installing](#) is crucial to data security, but you can't drop your guard just because the permissions seem fine.

Plenty of malware apps and phishing campaigns try to [steal your social media account info with fake login pages](#). The safest strategy is to *only* log in through a social media platform's official app.

However, if for some reason you do need to log in via a web browser, confirm the page is legit first. Check everything—the URL, images, layout, text, even the color of the page when you view all tabs. If they don't match, then it's a fake.

That's why having extra layers of security on all your accounts is important: even if your password is stolen, it'll be difficult for someone to break in if they don't have access to your 2FA codes.
